FOREWORD

ISO (the International Organization for Standardization) is a worldwide federation of national standards institutes (ISO member bodies). The work of developing International Standards is carried out through ISO technical committees. Every member body interested in a subject for which a technical committee has been set up has the right to be represented on that committee. Prior to 1972, the results of the work of the technical committees were published as ISO Recommendations; these documents are in the process of being transformed into International Standards. As part of this process, Technical Committee ISO/TC 47, Chemistry, has reviewed ISO Recommendation R 1390-1970 and found it technically suitable for transformation. The technical committee, however, divided the recommendation into six parts (ISO 1390, parts I to VI), which therefore replace ISO Recommendation R 1390-1970, to which they are technically identical.
